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CORONAVIRUS AND SCHOOLS: FAQS The House of Common's Library has updated the briefing on Coronavirus in schools frequently asked questions (FAQs) following the release of examination results in summer 2020.

CORONAVIRUS: CHILD AND ADOLESCENT TO PARENT VIOLENCE- RESEARCH REPORT

Researchers at the University of Oxford and the University of Manchester have published a report looking at families experiencing child and adolescent to parent violence (C/APV) during the coronavirus pandemic. Findings from an online survey of 104 parents who have experienced C/APV from their child aged 10-19 years and 47 practitioners who work with families experiencing C/APV include: 70% of parents reported an increase in violent episodes during lockdown; 69% of practitioners said they had seen an increase in referrals for families experiencing C/APV; and 64% of practitioners identified that the severity or incidence of violence had increased. CORONAVIRUS: CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S HEALTH

An article in the British Medical Journal (BMJ) discusses the impact of lockdown on children and young people's health. Findings from a snap survey of more than 4,000 paediatricians across the UK and Ireland at the end of April 2020 show that 32% of 752 emergency department paediatricians had witnessed delayed presentations. Diabetes mellitus (new diagnosis/diabetic ketoacidosis) was the most common delayed presentation, followed by delayed presentations of sepsis and new cancer diagnoses.

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ONLINE HARM CONSULTATION RESULTS PUBLISHED

Catch 22 has published findings from an online harms consultation carried out between June and July 2020. Responses from young people, frontline professionals, tech platforms and others show that: 32% of young people have seen harm occur offline because of something which happened online; 73% have seen content online that they've found concerning: only 27% feel safe online all the time and 40% said they report online harms to the platform they are using. 38% of frontline practitioners said they do not feel sufficiently trained to deal with online behaviour.

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The Children's Commissioner for England has published data from the Department for Education (DfE) on the allocation of devices and 4G hotspots to disadvantaged children during lockdown shows that 200,000 devices and 50,000 routers were available, meaning that 37% of eligible children could not be allocated a device. Just over a third of disadvantaged children benefitted from the government's free laptop scheme, with 27 multi-academy

trusts receiving only one laptop each, figures published by the children's commissioner for England reveal.

Kent after the local authority said it could no longer accommodate arrivals. The children and young people are staying at the Border Force intake centre in Dover until they can be transferred to other local authorities, to be cared for under the national transfer scheme set up to more evenly share the costs of supporting unaccompanied children. Figures show that 448 unaccompanied asylum-seeking children had arrived in Kent up to 17 August 2020 compared with 199 up to the end of August in 2019.

Ofsted has announced that it will begin visits to local authorities and children's social care providers in England from September 2020. Ofsted has updated

the framework and guidance setting out arrangements for focused visits in light of the impact of the coronavirus pandemic and updated the guidance on assurance visits to children's social care providers that Ofsted will carry out from September 2020. A-level and GCSE students in England will be given grades estimated by their teachers, rather than by an algorithm, after a government U-turn. It follows uproar after about 40% of A-level results were downgraded by exams regulator Ofqual, which used a formula based on schools' prior grades. GCSE results in England, Wales and Northern Ireland come out on Thursday. Ofqual chair Roger Taylor and Education Secretary Gavin Williamson apologised for the "distress" caused.
