Discount cards – an update from Brian McKinstrie, Marketing Officer:

We told you we would be looking into discount cards and we have made enquiries to see if we could get you the Blue Light emergency services card for you as key workers. Unfortunately, membership is limited to current armed services personnel, NHS staff, the Fire Service and the Police – but we did try!

The next best option appears to be the Max discount card, which some of you have had before. But because there would be cost attached, we wanted to ask you first, is this something you want and think you could make use of.

The Max Card is UK wide discount card for foster families and families of children with additional needs. Max Cards can be used at venues across the UK to get free or discounted admissions, places it includes are Alton Towers, Legoland and Thorpe Park, as well as for Haven and Butlins holidays.

Clearly, it's not going to be as useful during the current Covid restrictions! But in principle, what do you think? Is it going to be something you will use, or is there another discount or membership card that you would like us to look into?

I'm sure that you will join me in giving a very warm welcome to Norah Waters who has joined us in the Recruitment and Assessment Team. Norah joins us from the Peripatetic Team and will be an Assessing Social Worker for new mainstream foster carers.

January has seen a promising start in terms of enquiries. Despite a national lockdown, it hasn't stopped 20 enquiries in 2 weeks coming through the door.

We have also launched our first 'Virtual' Information event on Microsoft Teams, to welcome new applications and answer all of those questions about becoming a foster carer.

A huge thank you to Pamela Williams who has done a fantastic job of supporting us with the information sessions and sharing some amazing stories about fostering.

We have some exciting things planned this month and moving forward including the virtual carer support groups and as Brian has already mentioned, our first ever 'Virtual' coffee morning. Be sure to attend where you can!

A message from Balwant Bains, Head Teacher Sandwell Virtual School:

As the Government announced another national lockdown that will last until at least February half-term, this has meant that most children have moved to remote learning organised by the school.

As you are aware, schools are required to be open for key worker and vulnerable pupils (Children in Care, Care Leavers or those who may have difficulty engaging with remote education at home (for example due to a lack of devices or quiet space to study)); I strongly urge you to send your child to school, a risk assessment may determine the level of support they need.

Supporting Home Learning:

1) The national on-line **learning resources** at the Oak National Academy offers access to a broad range of subjects from maths to art to languages, for every year group from Reception through to Year 10. <https://www.thenational.academy/online-classroom>

2) The BBC have also launched its own education package across TV and online, featuring celebrities and some of the best teachers – <https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/dailylessons>

3) You and your child will also have access to **Encyclopedia Britannica resources**, where there is a wealth of information that young people can use to complete homework and research without having to trawl through volumes of books. To access Britannica go to:

4) In case **anxiety** does set in over this uncertain period, I can recommend the following websites for excellent resources and advice.

5) Sandwell Virtual School will play its part in **bridging the digital divide** for our vulnerable children so that learning is personalised and relevant. So, during the period including 5th January 2021 to 1st April 2021; **If during the Personal Educating Plan (PEP) meeting it becomes apparent that the child needs a computer to research or complete school work then the PP+ can be directed into the purchase of a device for the child.**

Lastly Sandwell Virtual School expects that the Spring Term PEPs to be completed virtually, in the same way as in the Autumn term. It is paramount that all CIC are tracked termly as this information is fed into the wider CIC Care Plan and reviewed by Education, Social Care and Independent Reviewing Officers.

This is a rapidly changing situation and I will continue to write to you once further guidance is published.

Sandwell Connexions recognises that it's a difficult time for many Sandwell young people who are in care/former care and are anxious about how COVID-19 could affect their career opportunities. We would like to reassure you that we are operating a full 'Careers' service for your young person aged between 12 and 18 during the current Covid 19 lockdown.

The free service includes:

- Impartial careers information, advice and guidance virtual interviews
- Help with reviewing and updating their CV's
- Job search and interview techniques
- Help with changing career path and identifying skills and strengths
- Liaison with colleges and training providers who are offering online training/apprenticeships throughout this period of lockdown
- Exploring virtual work experience within the council

In addition, during January you and your young person are invited to attend one or both of the following events:

- The annual **New Year New Start careers show** which offers a wealth of advice, information on Post 16 Education and employment opportunities from a wide range of Colleges/training providers. It runs from **Monday, 25th January until Saturday, 30th January**.

A message from Kevin Smith, Social Worker – Family Solutions Team:

Hello everyone, my name is Kevin Smith and I'm a Social Worker in the Family Solutions Team. We work with families where relationships and behaviours are difficult and challenging.

Here is a short description of the work that is carried out in the Family Solutions Team:

The Family Solutions Team offer a crisis response service when needed. This is offered when a young person, their parent or main care giver has requested that their child be accommodated by the Local Authority (Trust). Where it has been identified that there are no safeguarding risks for the child to remain at home, FST will provide a crisis response within 24 hours, but usually this response is immediate.

As someone who has also been a foster carer for many years, I am aware of the situations that many of you deal with. On behalf of the Trust, I would like to say that we really appreciate the great job that you do for the children and young people in your care.

We are here as part of the support available to you to help you to continue the great job that you do. We look forward to working with you to help to make sure that the children and young people in your care are able to have the positive lives that we are all entitled to.

Learning and Development

Free training on Rights & Entitlements of Unaccompanied Asylum-Seeking Children - 15 & 25 February

West Midlands Strategic Migration Partnership (WMSMP) has arranged for Coram Children's Legal Centre to provide an introductory training course on 15 and 25 February covering the following topics:

- What is meant by the term 'UASC'
- Which countries UASC tend to come from, why they leave & typical journeys to the UK
- The UK asylum process & potential outcomes for UASC
- Roles & responsibilities of key organisations towards UASC (Home Office, children's services, legal representatives, health, education, police, third sector)
- Why age may be disputed & an introduction to the age assessment process
- The issues UASC tend to face when they turn 18 e.g. changes to immigration status & support from local authorities
- Why some UASC are trafficked to the UK &/or within the UK
- Where to access support for UASC & former UASC care leavers

It is designed for anyone caring for, working with or otherwise supporting UASC within social care, health, education, community safety and the third sector, particularly within the West Midlands.

Adoption@Heart are kick starting the new year by once again, calling all those who are considering adoption, or would like some more information, to take the next step and get in touch.

Last year, the Regional Adoption Agency for the Black Country saw an increase in adoption enquiries during the coronavirus pandemic, with more people contacting the adoption agency to find out what the process involves and how they could start their adoption journey.

The team are as passionate as ever about delivering the best support to children awaiting adoption and to all adopters starting their journey.

Carol Moses, Recruitment and Assessment Team Manager said: “During the pandemic, we definitely saw more of an interest in adoption as families started to think about what was important to them.

“We also credit last year’s national ‘You Can Adopt’ campaign which helped bust myths around adoption, particularly around who is eligible to adopt.

“However, it’s a new year and our aims are the same. The need to recruit adopters remains and we are once again putting out a message for people to come forward and find out more about the adoption process.

“We will continue to do all we can to provide those considering adoption with all the information they need to make an informed decision.

“Being an adoptive parent can be challenging but it also brings great rewards. If you’re interested in finding out more, please contact Adoption@Heart today.”

Anyone can adopt, whether they are single, living together, married, a same sex couple, in employment or not working, or already have children or not. Potential adopters must legally be a UK resident and have been so for at least 12 months, as well as being aged 21 or over.


