Wear a face covering


- EKeep at least 2 metres apart from other shoppers

This is a dangerous time, especially for the older members of our community who are at greater risk of severe illness and death.



Help prevent youth homelessness during Covid-19

For any teenager, experiencing family breakdown is one of the most challenging things that they could ever face. The risk of homelessness for 16 - 18 year olds leaves them worrying even more during the Covid-19 pandemic, as many teenagers are left wondering what will happen and where they will go.

The YMCA Open Door project has been placing young people at risk of homelessness with host families for 11 years, but at this particular time, there is even more need for more hosts – people who have a spare room within their house and a caring heart.

Hosts receive over £100 per week while a young person is staying with them.
